

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# ABSTRACT

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) as the lead federal agency, is preparing a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) for the Hampton Roads Crossing Study (HRCS) located in the cities of Chesapeake, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Suffolk, Virginia. The SEIS re-evaluates the findings of the 2001 HRCS Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) and Record of Decision (ROD). Five alternatives are under consideration for the SEIS: a no-build alternative and four Build Alternatives. The four Build Alternatives are assessed in this technical report. The purpose of this technical report is to provide the results of the Architectural Survey conducted in association with the Project. Information in this report will support discussions presented in the SEIS and coordination of the HRCS pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (54 U.S.C. 306108) with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and other consulting parties.

The architectural assessment took into consideration a total of 1,321 architectural resources (individual or district), which would be 50 years of age or older as of 2026, within the APE for Direct and Indirect Effects. Nineteen of these resources have been determined eligible for listing on the NRHP by the VDHR or are listed on the NRHP. A total of 1,297 located within the project APE have been determined or recommended not eligible for listing on the NRHP. As part of the current assessment VDHR Phase I level survey documentation either updated or created forms for 778 resources: 151 previously recorded and 627 newly recorded. Five resources are newly recommended as eligible or potentially eligible (included in the 778 resources surveyed during the current project). Three additional resources were also assessed: the Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267), the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail, and the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail. Forty-two of the previously recorded resources have been demolished.

The architectural survey assessed by alternative resulted in eight NRHP-listed resources, seven NRHPeligible, three recommended as NRHP-eligible, and 827 not eligible resources in Alternative A; eight NRHP-listed resources, eight NRHP-eligible, four recommended as NRHP-eligible, and 936 recommended not eligible in Alternative B; three NRHP-listed resources, three NRHP-eligible, three recommended as NRHP-eligible, and 447 not eligible in Alternative C; and 11 NRHP-listed resources, eight NRHP-eligible, five recommended as NRHP-eligible, and 1,297 not eligible in Alternative D. Assessed by city the survey resulted in one NRHP-listed and 103 resources determined not eligible in Chesapeake; eight NRHP-listed, two NRHP-eligible, two resources recommended NRHP-eligible, and 335 resources recommended or determined not eligible in Hampton; two NRHP-listed, one resource recommended NRHP-eligible, one resource recommended NRHP-eligible, and 523 resources recommended or determined not eligible in Norfolk; 95 resources recommended or determined not eligible in Portsmouth; and 10 resources recommended or determined not eligible in Suffolk.

Property access could not be obtained to update existing documentation on four additional previously recorded resources last surveyed more than five years ago. One additional resource, the Big Bethel Battlefield (VDHR #114-5297; ABPP #VA003), previously has been determined by the VDHR not eligible for the NRHP and was not resurveyed during the current effort.



# 1. INTRODUCTION

# **1.1 PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) as the lead federal agency, is preparing a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) for the Hampton Roads Crossing Study (HRCS). The Study is located in the cities of Chesapeake, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Suffolk, Virginia. The SEIS re-evaluates the findings of the 2001 HRCS Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) and Record of Decision (ROD). The three alternatives retained for analysis in the 2001 FEIS, as well as input received from the public during initial scoping for the SEIS, were used to establish the Study Area Corridors shown in **Figure 1**. The purpose and need of the SEIS is summarized below.

Pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969, as amended, FHWA is preparing an SEIS because of the time that has lapsed since the 2001 FEIS and new information indicating significant environmental impacts not previously considered. The SEIS, prepared in accordance with the implementing regulations of NEPA (23 CFR §771.130), is intended to aid in ensuring sound decision-making moving forward by providing a comparative understanding of the potential effects of the various options.

The purpose of this Technical Report is to provide the results of the Architectural Survey conducted in support of the Project. Information in this report, described below, will support discussions presented in the SEIS and coordination of the HRCS pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (54 U.S.C. 306108) with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and other consulting parties. The Director of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (VDHR) serves as the Virginia SHPO. Information in this report, described below, will support discussions presented in the SEIS. Section 1 of this report provides an overview of the study and outlines the methods used to conduct the Architectural Survey and identify potentially significant architectural resources within both the direct and indirect Areas of Potential Effects for cultural resources studies. This is followed by the results of the architectural survey, including a discussion of previously recorded resources not re-surveyed; previously recorded resources that were re-surveyed and updated; and newly recorded resources dating to 1976 and earlier. Section 3 summarizes the results of the architectural survey and those resources identified as listed on or eligible for listing on the NRHP.


# **1.1.1** Purpose and Need

The purpose of the HRCS SEIS is to relieve congestion at the I-64 Hampton Roads Bridge-Tunnel (HRBT) in a manner that improves accessibility, transit, emergency evacuation, and military and goods movement along the primary transportation corridors in the Hampton Roads region, including the I-64, I-664, I-564, and VA 164 corridors. The HRCS will address the following needs (in the order of presentation in Chapter 1 of the Draft SEIS):

- Accommodate travel demand capacity is inadequate on the Study Area Corridors, contributing to congestion at the HRBT;
- Improve transit access the lack of transit access across the Hampton Roads waterway;
- Increase regional accessibility limited number of water crossings and inadequate highway capacity and severe congestion decrease accessibility;

- Address geometric deficiencies insufficient vertical and horizontal clearance at the HRBT contribute to congestion;
- Enhance emergency evacuation capability increase capacity for emergency evacuation, particularly at the HRBT;
- Improve strategic military connectivity congestion impedes military movement missions; and,
- Increase access to port facilities inadequate access to interstate highway travel in the Study Area Corridors impacts regional commerce.

# 1.1.2 Alternatives

Five alternatives, including the No-Build Alternative, are under consideration for the Draft SEIS and are assessed in this Technical Report. The proposed limits of the four Build Alternatives are shown on **Figure 2**. Each Technical Report and Memorandum prepared in support of the Draft SEIS assesses existing conditions and environmental impacts along the Study Area Corridors (**Figure 1**) for each alternative. Each alternative is comprised of various roadway alignments, used to describe the alternatives and proposed improvements, shown on **Figure 3**.

#### The No-Build Alternative

This alternative includes continued routine maintenance and repairs of existing transportation infrastructure within the Study Area Corridors, but there would be no major improvements.

#### Alternative A

Alternative A begins at the I-64/I-664 interchange in Hampton and creates a consistent six-lane facility by widening I-64 to the I-564 interchange in Norfolk. A parallel bridge-tunnel would be constructed west of the existing I-64 HRBT. During the public review of the HRBT DEIS, there was a clear lack of public or political support for the level of impacts associated with any of the Build Alternatives. Specifically, potential impacts to the historic district at Hampton University, Hampton National Cemetery, and the high number of displacements were key issues identified by the public, elected officials, and University and Veterans Affairs officials. Given this public opposition, a Preferred Alternative was not identified and the study did not advance. On August 20, 2015, FHWA rescinded its Notice of Intent to prepare the HRBT DEIS, citing public and agency comments and concerns over the magnitude of potential environmental impacts to a variety of resources, such as impacts to historic resources as well as communities and neighborhoods. Consequently, VDOT and FHWA have committed that improvements proposed in the HRCS SEIS to the I-64 corridor would be largely confined to existing right-of-way. To meet this commitment, Alternative A considers a six-lane facility. Alternative A lane configurations are summarized in **Table 1**.



# Alternative B

Alternative B includes all of the improvements included under Alternative A, and the existing I-564 corridor that extends from its intersection with I-64 west towards the Elizabeth River. I-564 would be extended to connect to a new bridge-tunnel across the Elizabeth River (I-564 Connector). A new roadway (VA 164 Connector) would extend south from the I-564 Connector, along the east side of the Craney Island Dredged Material Management Area (CIDMMA), and connect to existing VA 164. VA 164 would be widened from this intersection west to I-664. Alternative B lane configurations are summarized in **Table 2**.

Note: The I-564 Intermodal Connector (IC) project is separate from HRCS that lies between the I-564 Connector and I-564. It would be constructed regardless of whether the HRCS improvements are made and therefore is included under the No-Build Alternative and is not listed with other proposed improvements.

# Alternative C

Alternative C includes the same improvements along I-564, the I-564 Connector, and the VA 164 Connector that are considered in Alternative B. This alternative would not propose improvements to I-64 or VA 164 beyond the VA 164 Connector. Alternative C includes dedicated transit facilities in specific locations. DRPT completed a study in November 2015 that recommended high frequency bus rapid transit (BRT) service in a fixed guideway or in a shared high occupancy vehicle (HOV) or high occupancy toll (HOT) lanes (DRPT, 2015). Based on that recommendation, for the purposes of this Draft SEIS, transit assumes Bus Rapid Transit (BRT). In the Final SEIS, transit could be redefined or these lanes may be used as managed lanes. Alternative C converts one existing HOV lane in each direction on I-564 in Norfolk to transit only. The I-564 Connector and the I-664 Connector would be constructed with transit only lanes. This alternative also includes widening along I-664 beginning at I-664/I-64 in Hampton and the new interchange with the I-664 Connector. Alternative C lane configurations are summarized in **Table 3**.

#### Alternative D

Alternative D is a combination of the sections that comprise Alternatives B and C. Alternative D lane configurations are summarized in **Table 4**.

# **1.1.3** Operationally Independent Sections

Given the magnitude and scope of the alternatives, it is expected that a Preferred Alternative would be constructed in stages or operationally independent sections (OIS). An OIS is a portion of an alternative that could be built and function as a viable transportation facility even if other portions of the alternative are not advanced. The OIS are comprised of various roadway alignments and were developed by identifying sections of roadway improvements that if constructed, could function independently. The results of the survey have been summarized by project alternative in Section 3. Recommendations for additional study have also been included for those resources identified as being potentially eligible for the NRHP.



# 1.2 METHODOLOGY

For the purposes of analyzing the four Build Alternatives in the SEIS, 500-foot-wide Study Area Corridors have been delineated for each alternative. The Study Area Corridors extend 250 feet on either side of the centerlines of I-64, I-564, I-664, VA 164 and proposed new alignments (see **Figure 1**). Areas around the interchanges included in the Study Area Corridors vary based on the footprint of proposed modifications. For the purposes of Section 106, the Study Area Corridor for each alternative constitutes the Area of Potential Effects (APE) for Direct Effects, i.e., the area in which there is potential for direct impacts on historic properties to occur.

These 500-foot Study Area Corridors were recognized as so-called "worst-case scenarios" for direct impacts. As work on this SEIS has proceeded, more realistic and narrower Limits of Disturbance (LOD) have been delineated for each alternative. The LOD was developed using the proposed pavement width of the mainline alternatives and the selected roadside design option (open section, guardrail section, retaining wall, or sound wall) based on the existing roadside conditions and constraints. The LOD is conservative and accounts for an additional 30 feet beyond the improvements to accommodate drainage, utilities, erosion and sediment control, and construction easements. In locations where the LOD exceeds the 500-foot Study Area Corridor, the APE for Direct Effects has been adjusted to match the limits of the LOD.

In general, in undeveloped areas or in areas where alternatives cross water, the APE for Indirect Effects (e.g., visual or auditory effects) extends 500 feet beyond each side of the 500-foot Study Area Corridor. In developed areas where the Build Alternatives would involve improvements to existing highways, the Indirect Effects APE extends across tax parcels directly abutting the 500-foot Study Area Corridor and across any parcels immediately adjacent to the abutting properties. However, in developed areas where city blocks were set at less than a 90 degree angle to the existing interstate, residential parcels located more than two parcels removed from the Direct Effects APE and which might have a direct view of the 500-foot corridor were included within the Indirect Effects APE. In the vicinity of the Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel (HRBT), the Indirect Effects APE was expanded to include the historic property boundaries of Fort Monroe (DHR Inventory No. 114-0002), Fort Wool (114-0041), the Chamberlin Hotel (114-0114), and Old Point Comfort Lighthouse (114-0021) in their entirety.

The architectural survey was conducted by Stantec, assisted by Rummel, Klepper & Kahl, LLP (RK&K), with the goal of identifying all above-ground cultural resources (e.g., buildings, structures, objects, industrial resources, cemeteries, landscapes, districts, etc.) within the APE for Direct and Indirect Effects which would be 50 years of age or older in the year 2026 or which would meet NRHP Criteria Consideration G (for properties that have achieved significance within the last fifty years). The survey effort included three tasks: background research and compilation of data on previously recorded resources documented in the VDHR's Virginia Cultural Resources Information System (V-CRIS system); revisiting and updating survey documentation and NRHP evaluations for previously recorded resources last surveyed more than 5 years ago; and conducting reconnaissance-level (Phase I) survey and providing NRHP evaluations for previously unrecorded resources constructed in 1976 or earlier per consultation with the VDOT and the VDHR.



# **1.2.1** Background Research

During this effort, Stantec compiled information on all previously identified resources within the APE. Background research included a review of the VDHR's V-CRIS database; reports and documentation on previously conducted surveys within the APE for all four alternatives; and reviews of both historic aerial photography as well as historic maps where determined appropriate. **Table 5** documents the previous cultural resources studies conducted in support of the HRCS study that were utilized in preparation for the field survey.

In addition to compiling information regarding previously recorded resources, Stantec staff conducted tax parcel data research to identify those resources that dated to 1976 or earlier that would require survey and recordation as part of the reconnaissance level survey. This research also included reviews of available historic aerial photographs as well as historic topographic maps to assist in verification of resources for survey. Background research also focused on two non-traditional historic resources – the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail and the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Historic Trail – which were identified within the APE. Both trails were considered with regards to a resource-type specific APE which includes an area within the Hampton Roads extending from just east of the HRBT encompassing Fort Monroe to just west of the Monitor-Merrimac Memorial Bridge-Tunnel (MMMBT) (see **Appendix E**: Maps E-5 and E-7). A third resource, the Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267), was identified as a resource for which additional documentation would be required in addition to those resources identified for traditional Phase I level architectural survey.

# **1.2.2** Architectural Survey

The architectural survey addressed three general categories of resources. These categories were:

- Previously recorded resources last updated prior to 2010. Existing V-CRIS forms for this category of resources were updated according to VDHR standards.
- Previously recorded resources recorded between 2010 and 2015 that have not received a VDHR determination of eligibility for listing on the NRHP. Existing V-CRIS forms for this category of resources were updated with Stantec's NRHP-eligibility recommendation.
- Previously unrecorded resources dating to 1976 or earlier. V-CRIS forms meeting VDHR standards were created.

Certain resources were identified prior to the initiation of the survey that would not require further documentation. This list of resources, prepared and provided by VDOT, included properties that had been previously listed on or determined eligible by the VDHR for listing on the NRHP, were identified as determined by the VDHR to be not eligible for listing on the NRHP and were surveyed less than five years ago, and battlefield resources located within the APE, with the exception of the Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267). Although the Pasture Point (VDHR #014-0118) and Phoebus – Mill Creek Terrace Neighborhood (VDHR #114-5002) (see Section 2.1) are listed historic districts and not slated for resurvey as a whole, resources that dated to 1976 or earlier which had not been previously surveyed, were documented during the current survey effort as stated in the Scope of Work Phase II.

Phase I level architectural survey, according to the *Guidelines for Conducting Historic Resources Survey in Virginia* (VDHR 2011), is a visual inspection or examination of historic resources in a specific geographical area. With the exception of resources located within post-World War II (WWII) neighborhoods, project specific requirements encompassed the following: 1) three to five exterior photographs of the primary resources and one to two exterior photographs of each historic secondary resource; 2) a description of the property with information needed to create a record for the VDHR's V-CRIS database that includes identification number, name of property, address, location, site description, classification, exterior materials and treatment, date of construction, architectural description, condition, secondary resource description, historic context identification, and property owner; 3) a site plan showing the primary resource and its relationship to any secondary resources and roadways; and 4) interview of the property owner if available.

An alternative survey strategy for planned post-WWII neighborhoods was developed by the VDOT in consultation with the VDHR and was utilized for this project. Each planned post-WWII neighborhood was evaluated as a potential historic district and the individual buildings located within the APE were inventoried as contributing resources to the neighborhood district. The separate buildings within the project APE were not evaluated as individual properties, but each was documented with a single photograph of the primary elevation. Each street within the neighborhood that falls within the APE was photographed. Neighborhood layout and general architectural characteristics were documented through written notes and drawn site plans. Although residences and streets falling outside of the project APE were not individually documented, the potential, overall boundary of the neighborhood district was identified through vehicular survey and/or research in local tax parcel databases. A single V-CRIS form was created for each neighborhood district.



This alternative survey strategy was expected to be sufficient to identify historic properties because, if a post-WWII residential structure is eligible for the NHRP, it most likely would be eligible as a contributing element to a NRHP-eligible district. Standard VDHR survey methodology was applied for any architect-designed residences encountered within post-WWII neighborhoods to ensure that residential structures that might be individually eligible for the NRHP because of their architectural merit were identified. Standard VDHR survey methodology was also applied to individual structures within post-WWII neighborhoods that were of unique or significantly different style or plan in comparison to the other residential structures that comprise and are characteristic of the neighborhood.

Resources surveyed were assessed for their potential eligibility for listing on the NRHP at the local, state, and/or national level. Evaluation of the resources also considered potentially significant historic themes, as defined by the VDHR (2011).

Potential eligibility of architectural resources requires that one or more of the NRHP Criteria (National Park Service 2014) be met: Criterion A, association with significant events in the broad patterns of national history; Criterion B, association with the lives of persons significant in our past or Criterion C, embodiment of the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, representative of the work of a master, or possession of high artistic values. Where individual structures do not meet these NRHP criteria, but constitute a significant and cohesive group of related buildings, a potential NRHP district may be considered. Criterion D, which assesses if a resource has yielded, or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history, is often reserved for archaeological sites, but may also apply to historic architectural resources, and more importantly for the current investigation, non-traditional resources like historic water trails and battlefield resources.

Fieldwork for the architectural investigation was conducted by vehicle and on foot. The Stantec Senior Architectural Historian supervising the survey was Sandra DeChard who was assisted in the field by Emily Curme, Jody Kutzler, Tracey McDonald, Erika Schroeder, Donald Sadler, and Wes Stewart. RK&K Senior Architectural Historian Philip Hayden conducted the fieldwork with the assistance of Architectural Historian Elizabeth Fagan. Fieldwork was conducted between December 9, 2015 and January 22, 2016.

In addition to the traditional architectural survey, research was conducted for three additional resources – the Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267), the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail, and the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail. This research was conducted and compiled by R. Taft Kiser, Donald Sadler, and Ellen M. Brady. Assessments of each of these three resources with respect to current conditions and potential NRHP eligibility were also conducted. We appreciate the assistance of Mr. John Brewer Moore of Portsmouth, Virginia who provided an oral interview regarding the history of the Battle of Craney Island.

# **1.2.3** Documentation

Following the fieldwork, Stantec, with the assistance of RK&K, prepared V-CRIS forms for all surveyed resources as well as a management summary documenting the results of the survey and identifying those resources that may be eligible for listing on the NRHP. Stantec's Senior Architectural Historian supervised the preparation of the V-CRIS forms. A single set of black and white photographs for architectural properties was prepared according to VDHR standards and for submittal to the VDHR with



the final V-CRIS forms. All final V-CRIS forms included appropriate supporting documentation including a property site plan.

Ellen M. Brady was the overall project manager for Stantec. V-CRIS forms were prepared by Stantec staff Sandra DeChard, Emily Curme, Erika Schroeder, Brynn Stewart, and Aimee Leithoff and RK&K staff Philip Hayden and Elizabeth Fagan. Sean Sutor provided GIS support and prepared project mapping. Stantec Architectural Technician, Jody Kutzler oversaw photograph production and labeling support for the final V-CRIS documentation. Additional assistance was provided by RK&K GIS coordinator Ryan Sless as well as RK&K project managers Eric Almquist and Maggie Berman.

# 2. **RESULTS OF THE ARCHITECTURAL SURVEY**

There are a total of 1,321 architectural resources (individual or district) that will be 50 years of age or older as of 2026 within the APE for Direct and Indirect Effects that were included in the current survey. Nineteen of these resources have been determined eligible for listing on the NRHP by the VDHR or are listed on the NRHP. A total of 1,297 located within the project APE have been determined or recommended not eligible for listing on the NRHP. As part of the current assessment VDHR Phase I level survey documentation either updated or created forms for 778 resources: 151 previously recorded and 627 newly recorded. Five resources are newly recommended as eligible or potentially eligible (included in the 778 resources surveyed during the current project). Property access could not be obtained to update existing documentation on four additional previously recorded resources last surveyed more than five years ago. One additional resource, the Big Bethel Battlefield (VDHR #114-5297; ABPP #VA003), previously has been determined by the VDHR not eligible for the NRHP and was not resurveyed during the current effort.

# 2.1 PREVIOUSLY RECORDED RESOURCES LISTED ON OR DETERMINED ELIGIBLE FOR LISTING ON THE NRHP

Nineteen previously recorded architectural resources in the current APE have been previously listed on the NRHP or determined eligible for listing on the NRHP by the VDHR. The 19 previously recorded NRHP-eligible or listed resources include seven historic districts, seven individual resources, two cemeteries, and two Civil War period battlefields recognized by the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP)<sup>1</sup> (Table 6; Appendix A). Two resources, Fort Monroe (VDHR #114-0002) and the Hampton Institute Historic District (VDHR #114-0006), are also National Historic Landmarks (NHL).

*Fort Monroe (VDHR #114-0002),* located in Hampton east of the community of Phoebus and north of the HRBT (**Appendix A**: Map 1), was designated as a NHL in December of 1960 largely because of its historical significance and the integrity of the associated architecture. The property was listed on the NRHP in 1966 and on the Virginia Landmarks Register in 1969 (Melvin 1966). In 1973, the Secretary of the Interior expanded the boundary of the NHL district to include the entirety of Fort Monroe within the floodwall. Fort Monroe's NHL district period of significance was determined as 1819-1946, which comprised the initial construction of the Third System fortification through the end of WWII. Since then, archaeological work has extended this period of significance to include earlier indicators of military defenses at Old Point Comfort and prehistoric Native American activity (Melvin 1972; Lissandrello 1975).

Hampton Institute Historic District (VDHR #114-0006) is located near the mouth of the Hampton River on approximately 201 acres now associated with Hampton University (**Appendix A**: Map 2). The district was listed on the NRHP in 1969 and listed as an NHL in 1974 (VHLC 1969). The NHL boundaries of the resource are limited to approximately 15 acres including the core historic buildings associated with the Institute as well as the Emancipation Oak. The first historically African-American college in the country, classes were first taught to escaping slaves by the American Missionary Association in 1861. Later, starting in 1878, a Native American education program was begun at the Hampton Institute. Included within the property and also the NHL boundary associated with the Institute is the Emancipation Oak, where, in 1861, Mary Peake taught children of slaves freed at the outset of the Civil War. The oak was also the location of the first southern reading of President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. The



Hampton Institute is listed under Criteria A and C for its importance in history as well as its architecture. The period of significance spans the greater part of the nineteenth century (VHLC 1969).

Old Point Comfort Lighthouse (VDHR #114-0021), located within the current bounds of Fort Monroe on Fenwick Road, was constructed at the southern edge of Old Point Comfort at the northern entrance to the Hampton Roads harbor (**Appendix A**: Map 3). The lighthouse was constructed in 1802 and is the second oldest lighthouse on the Chesapeake Bay. A short time after its construction, the moat and fortifications associated with Fort Monroe were constructed just under 100 feet away from the lighthouse structure. The lighthouse is octagonal in form and constructed of ashlar stone. The lighthouse light has been changed several times, however the lighthouse structure retains its original form. The lighthouse is white-washed regularly to maintain its appearance and is an active light. Adjacent to the lighthouse is the light keeper's house constructed circa 1900. The Old Point Comfort Lighthouse was listed on the NRHP in 1973, and while the nomination form is not explicit regarding the applicable NRHP Criteria, it would appear that the lighthouse's significance lies in its importance to the history of the region (Criterion A) and its architecture (Criterion C) (VHLC 1973).

Fort Wool (VDHR #114-0041) was listed on the NRHP in 1969 and is located on a 15-acre island constructed of granite blocks approximately one mile south of Fort Monroe and adjacent to the western entrance to the HRBT tunnel (Appendix A: Map 4) (VHLC 1969). The construction of Fort Wool, originally named Fort Calhoun, began in 1819 as part of a coastal fortification plan. Construction of the Fort progressed slowly until the onset of the Civil War. At the time of the Civil War the lower tiers of the fort had 52 casemates ready for guns and 187 soldiers were stationed there. The Fort was renamed Fort Wool in honor of Major General John Wool, Commandant of the Hampton Roads fortifications. Following the Civil War, from 1886 until the time of World War I (WWI), the fort was not garrisoned, but was reinstated during WWI and WWII as part of the harbor defense system. Fort Wool was abandoned in 1953 and in 1967 the Federal Government returned the ownership of the fort to the Commonwealth of Virginia. The fort retains its original ramparts on the western end and Civil War period batteries are also present on the southwestern end of the island. Two towers, located at either end of the island, date to WWI and a third concrete tower in the center of the island dates to WWII. Fort Wool is significant under Criterion A for its military significance as well as Criterion C for its architecture. The Fort's period of significance, as noted on the nomination form, is primarily nineteenth century, however its use during the World Wars could extend that period of significance to the 1940s (VHLC 1969).

Hampton Veterans Affairs Medical Center Historic District (VDHR #114-0101) is located west of I-64 near Mallory Street in Hampton and comprises approximately 266 acres of land on a peninsula adjacent to Hampton University (Appendix A: Map 5) (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). The Historic District is owned and managed by the US Department of Veterans Affairs. The hospital began operations in 1872 and is the fourth oldest military-run hospital in the country. There are four main periods of development associated with the district: 1) the Pre-Home Era (1854-1869), 2) the Early Southern Branch Era (1870- 1907), 3) the Master Plan Era (1908-1912), and 4) the Architectural Set Era (1938-1940). The interruption in dates, according to the VHDR site form, is accounted for by lulls in construction. The period of significance for the district as noted on the site form is 1854-1944 which coincides with the possible dates of the first building construction associated with the district and the closing years of WW II. The Hampton Veterans Affairs Medical Center Historic District is a complete medical complex with 82 resources on the campus, 34 of which contribute to the historic district. The Historic District was determined eligible for listing on the NRHP by the Keeper of the National Register in 1981 under Criteria A and C and retains integrity of location, feeling, workmanship, materials, design,



and association. It is also noted in the VDHR V-CRIS documentation that the resource may be potentially eligible under Criterion D for its archaeological potential (VDHR Site Files).

Pasture Point Historic District (VDHR #114-0118) is a late-nineteenth/early-twentieth century neighborhood located north of the central business district in Hampton, Virginia and listed on the NRHP under Criterion A as an example of an early suburb driven by local transportation developments (Dowling et al. 2012) (Appendix A: Map 6). It is also eligible under Criterion C as a collection of significant residential architectural styles with characteristic urban design composition and grid pattern street layout. The period of significance is 1885-1938 when streetcars and trolleys dominated local transportation. It is characteristic of early streetcar developments and is characterized by a patterned street layout and is tied to the nationally significant expansion of the railroad system by virtue of its initial platting by railroad mogul Collis P. Huntington's Old Dominion Land Company (Dowling et al. 2012). Many of the grandest and most varied Queen Anne style houses are set back across broad lawns on Pembroke Avenue, or along waterfront that surrounds the district on three sides. The district is predominately residential, but does include several commercial buildings. The district as recommended eligible for the NRHP in 2008 was located both north and south of the I-64 corridor, however at the time of the completion of the final NRHP nomination and listing on the NRHP in 2012 the boundaries were limited to just the portion of the neighborhood and district south of I-64 and bound by I-64 to the north, the Hampton River to the east and south, and the eastern facing residences on Washington Street (see Appendix A: Map 6).

*Chamberlin Hotel (VDHR #114-0114),* located at #2 Fenwick Road within the bounds of Fort Monroe, was listed on the NRHP in 2007 under Criterion C for its architecture (**Appendix A**: Map 7) (Sadler et al. 2006). The hotel was completed in 1928 and was designed by prominent Richmond architect Marcellus Wright, Sr., who also designed the John Marshall Hotel and Mosque Auditorium in Richmond, Virginia. Wright's building design is an example of Beaux-Arts style and reflects the colonial heritage of the Peninsula as well as the influence of prominent early twentieth century Beaux-Arts architects of the firm Warren and Wetmore. The Chamberlin served primarily as a resort hotel but also accommodated WWII officers and their families in the 1940s. The building is nine stories tall, u-shaped, and fronts on the Hampton Roads. The Chamberlin has been renovated and currently serves as a luxury retirement community.

Hampton National Cemetery (VDHR #114-0148) The Hampton National Cemetery is presently comprised of two noncontiguous parcels (**Appendix A**: Map 8). The older portion of the cemetery, established in 1866, is located south of I-64. The Phoebus Section, purchased in 1891, is located on Cemetery Road at Marshall Avenue in Hampton, about 2 miles northwest of Fort Monroe. Hampton National Cemetery was listed on the NRHP in 1996 under Criterion A with a period of significance of 1866 to 1940 and is part of the Multiple Property Document (MPD) *Civil War Era National Cemeteries* (Sammartino 1996). The boundary of the Phoebus Section of the Hampton National Cemetery, on the north side of I-64, is adjacent to the existing roadway right-of-way as noted on the 1977 I-64 highway plans and the VDHR's V-CRIS system. The Phoebus Section of the cemetery was originally demarcated by a substantial 5-foot high brick wall combined with wrought iron finishes and gates. Portions of the gates and wall were replaced with chain link fencing in the mid-twentieth century. Hampton National Cemetery was closed on July 11, 1969 but 14 years later in 1983, the cemetery was reopened creating additional gravesites between the existing graves. The cemetery was officially closed in 1993 (Sammartino 1996).

*Phoebus–Mill Creek Terrace Neighborhood Historic District (VDHR #114-5002)* is situated in Hampton along Mill Creek (**Appendix A**: Map 9). The community was not formally incorporated until 1874 when



it was named Chesapeake City. In 1900, the name was changed to Phoebus, in honor of Harrison Phoebus, who developed the well-known Hygeia Hotel as a resort adjacent to the town. The town is laid out in a gridiron pattern that was developed in 1874 upon incorporation. The area developed as a stopover point between Hampton and Norfolk due to its close proximity to Old Point Comfort and the ferry crossing. The town grew during the Reconstruction period with the addition of a railroad line, streetcar line, commercial corridor, and supporting residential buildings. The historic district was listed on the NRHP in 2006 under Criteria A and C for its development as a town in Elizabeth City County (later annexed to Hampton in 1952) during the fourth quarter of the nineteenth century and for its to the opening of the HRBT in that year (Pollard 2006). The opening of the tunnel resulted in the elimination of major traffic through Phoebus resulting in a halt to construction and modern development. The town of Phoebus appears largely as it did in 1957 when the tunnel opened.

Battle of Hampton Roads (VDHR #114-5471; ABPP #VA008) was a naval engagement, and almost all of the defined battlefield area comprises open water (**Appendix A**: Map 10). The Battle of Hampton Roads, often referred to as either the Battle of the Monitor and Merrimack (or Virginia) or the Battle of Ironclads was perhaps one of the most notable battles of the Civil War. The hull and engines of the USS Merrimack, scuttled when Norfolk was abandoned by the Union in 1861, were salvaged by the Confederates. Renamed the C.S.S. Virginia when launched on February 17, 1862, the first ironclad of the war sported ten heavy guns.

The US Navy's ironclad, the USS Monitor, had launched on January 30, 1862. The 172-foot long (52.4 m), 41.5-foot wide (12.6 m) Monitor also rode low in the water. On the morning of March 9, 1862 the Virginia sailed toward the Union fleet anchored at Fort Monroe. The Monitor prepared for battle. Shortly after 8 A.M., as the Virginia opened fire on the USS Minnesota, the Monitor moved into position near the Confederate ironclad, rotated its turret, and opened fire. Eventually, the Monitor began to leak and the iron plates separated from the wooden backing. The vessel, which had been maneuvering in the direction of Fort Monroe, continued to sail as crew members tended to the injured John Lorimer Worden, commander of the Monitor (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). Thinking the Monitor was retiring from the fray, the Virginia's officers set course for Norfolk, ending the engagement. A total of 433 casualties were suffered during the battle. The ABPP has defined a Study Area of 46,034.51 acres for the engagement, with 35,040.82 acres defined as Potentially Eligible for the National Register (PotNR) lands (see Appendix A: Map 10). The ABPP (2009) has also noted that the areas that retain integrity are located essentially on water. On land, only historic and archaeological resources at Fort Monroe and Fort Wool retain integrity. Fort Monroe and Fort Wool are located outside of the ABPP Core Area, and were not directly involved in the engagement. The Battle of Hampton Roads is considered eligible for listing on the NRHP under Criterion A for its significance and association with the Civil War with a period of significance from 1861-1865.

*St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church* (VDHR #121-0032), located at 230 33<sup>rd</sup> Street in Newport News, was designed by the architect Carl Ruehrmund (1855-1927) in the Classical Revival style (**Appendix A**: Map 11). The church is a temple-form brick structure which features a monumental pedimented front portico supported by Composite columns, a heavy denticulated entablature, tall arched stained glass windows, and pilasters along the side elevations. The church was listed on the NRHP in 2005 under Criteria A and C, Criterion Consideration A (Religious Property) for its role as the first Catholic Church in Newport News; its association with Thomas Fortune Ryan and his wife, Ida Mary Berry Ryan, substantial benefactors in donating the funds for the convent and girls school; and its architectural



merit as an excellent example an early twentieth century Classical Revival, architect-designed church which has remained architecturally intact (Horner 2005).

The Noland Company Building (VDHR #121-0299), located at 2600 Warwick Boulevard, was purchased in 1920 by Lloyd U. Noland Sr. who utilized the building as a plumbing supply warehouse (**Appendix A**: Map 12). The building was renovated in 1938 as a result of continued growth of the business, which expanded into the international market and sold a variety of construction materials. Noland still remains a world-wide supplier. The Noland Company Building was listed on the NRHP in 2010, with a period of significance from 1938 to 1960, under Criteria A and B for its importance in broad patterns of history as the headquarters of the Noland Company and for its association with Lloyd U, Noland Sr., a civic leader and prominent self-made entrepreneur (Barrett et. al.:2009).

*Norfolk Naval Base Historic District (VDHR #122-0410),* as currently mapped in the VDHR's V-CRIS system is bounded by the Hampton Roads to the west, Willoughby Bay to the north and the Elizabeth River to the southwest, and is the largest Naval installation in the world. The mapped boundaries associated with the Norfolk Naval Base Historic District include two distinct installations – Naval Station Norfolk (NAS) and NSA Hampton Roads which includes Fleet Forces Command, the Staff College, the Sewell's Point Golf Course and several other facilities not located within the current project APE. Naval Station Norfolk, including NSA Hampton Roads, comprises nearly 5000 acres, equating to four square miles of land and seven miles of waterfront pier and wharf space, and was originally commissioned as the Naval Operating Base, Hampton Roads, in October 1917 (**Appendix A**: Map 13) (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). The base was renamed US Naval Base, Norfolk, in September 1945 and renamed again in 1957 to Naval Station Norfolk. Naval Station Norfolk shares the complex with six major commands with a primary mission of naval fleet support (NSN 2016).

Recent communication with cultural resources personnel for the Commander Navy Region Mid-Atlantic (CNRMA) documented that the current boundaries associated with the Norfolk Naval Base Historic District as noted in the VDHR's files are incorrect and are currently in revision (Personal Communication, Heather Robbins and Katherine Childs 2016). In addition, it was noted that there are four individual historic districts within the bounds of Naval Station Norfolk, only one of which, the Norfolk Naval Base Golf Club Historic District (VDHR #122-5045), is located within the APE for Indirect or Direct Effects for the HRCS SEIS project. This resource has been addressed individually. The Norfolk Naval Base Historic District is considered eligible for listing on the NRHP for purposes of the project, although it has not been formally evaluated for listing as a cohesive historic district. Rather, CNRMA staff has worked to define four individual districts within the base pursuant to the recently revised Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP) prepared in 2013 (Sadler et al. 2013).

*Forest Lawn Cemetery (VDHR #122-0531)* is located in Norfolk along Granby Street at the I-64/I-564 interchange (**Appendix A**: Map 14). The purposely designed landscape of Forest Lawn Cemetery reflects the continuation of the "rural" cemetery movement of the mid-nineteenth century and the change in philosophy of the early twentieth century cost effective and efficient cemetery maintenance and design. The initial, early twentieth century (1906 - c. 1935) portion of Forest Lawn Cemetery, and associated mausoleum and gatehouse, in 2012 was determined by the VDHR to be eligible for listing on the NRHP under Criterion A and Criteria Consideration D for broad patterns in history and reflects the "rural" cemetery movement as well as embodies the principals of early twentieth century cemetery planning and design, and professional management and caretaking while including a diverse, but sectioned interment population (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). The cemetery is also eligible under



Criterion C for its architectural merit and integrity of design of its built environment including the post 1910 mausoleum building and the c. 1910 gatehouse, both of which retain a high degree of original architectural elements distinctive of their time period of construction and are integral components in the design of Forest Lawn Cemetery. In addition the cemetery is also recommended as eligible under Criterion D for its archaeological potential.

Ocean View Elementary School (VDHR #122-0954), located at 9501 Mason Creek Road, was determined eligible for the NRHP by VDHR in 1998. The school is a 1939 Art Deco style building constructed in two parts and features a long, rectangular main school building and a perpendicular auditorium wing. Both are constructed of poured concrete and are two stories in height (**Appendix A**: Map 15). The central entry of the building is marked by a recessed pylon block with rounded corners and a central panel of vertical reeds in the parapet. The face of the block features an embossed seal of Norfolk depicting a three-mast sailing ship over a plow and three sheaves of wheat. A long wing of classrooms, added in 1949 to the northeast end of the original building comprises two parallel structures joined along their long sides. The school was determined eligible for listing by VDHR in 1998 on the NRHP at a local level of significance under Criteria A for its role in education and under Criterion C for its architectural merit with a period of significance between c. 1937 and 1949.

Norfolk Naval Base Golf Club Historic District (VDHR #122-5045) was determined eligible for listing on the NRHP by VDHR in 1997 at the state and local level under Criterion C primarily as a resource representative of the work of a master. The golf course and associated club house was designed by Donald Ross, a noted golf course designer during the 1920s and is located on Terminal Boulevard along the southern boundary of Naval Station Norfolk (**Appendix A**: Map 16) (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). The course was first established as part of the Norfolk Yacht and Country Club in 1924. The historic district is also important at the local level and is representative of the evolution of the region as a recreation area during the first decades of the twentieth century. Although not explicit in the documentation, the resource's period of significance is recommended as 1920-1942, terminating when the facility was purchased by the Navy.

Battle of Sewell's Point (VDHR #122-5426; ABPP #VA001) was a naval battle between Union and Confederate naval forces at the outset of the Civil War. It was among the first naval battles in the war, taking place during May 1861. The battle began during the late afternoon of May 18, 1861, when the USS Monticello opened fire on the unfinished battery at Sewell's Point to disrupt ongoing construction. The USS Thomas Freeborn soon joined the assault; both retired after inflicting slight damage to the battery emplacement. During the night, after the sounds of work on the battery drew new fire from the Monticello, and the newly emplaced cannons returned fire (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016). Captain Eagle, commanding the Monticello, unleashed the ship's full arsenal, including one of the few ten-inch Dahlgren guns that saw service, on the Sewell's Point battery. The firing ceased after an hour and a half, when the ship's ammunition ran out and the Confederate battery had only two rounds remaining (Salmon 2001:67-68). Damage to both sides was minimal (Kennedy 1998:5). The Battle of Sewell's Point has an ABPP-defined Study Area of 11,568.96 acres for the battle, 9,878.91 acres of which is classified as PotNR lands (ABPP 2009) (Appendix A: Map 17). Portions of the existing HRBT crossing are located within the PotNR area defined for the NRHP-eligible resource. The Battle of Sewell's Point is considered eligible for listing on the NRHP under Criterion A for its significance and association with the Civil War with a period of significance from 1861-1865.



*Merrimack Landing Apartment Complex/Merrimack Park Historic District (VDHR #122-5434)* is the first planned, government funded, low-cost defense housing project in Norfolk specifically designed and built to provide military housing during WWII for Naval personnel stationed at Naval Station Norfolk (NSN) (Appendix A: Map 18). The complex retains its curvilinear street pattern, green spaces and building stock with no modern in-fill present. Merrimack Park Historic District was determined eligible by the VDHR in 2012 for listing on the NRHP as a historic district under Criterion A for broad patterns in history as a purpose-built affordable military housing project sponsored in part by the United States Federal government during WWII and the first such community built in Norfolk to serve the military personnel at the NSN. Its period of significance extends from the early part of the twentieth century through 1945, during which time the complex was planned and constructed. The historic district is also eligible under Criterion C for community planning and development as well as landscape architecture. While the buildings lack individual distinction, the built environment maintains its integrity of location, design, association, and feeling in its overall historic plan and derives significance as a unified and cohesive entity that projects its early 1940s character. Additionally, Merrimack Park continues to serve its original function as rental housing for military personnel (VDHR Site Files, Accessed 2016).

Sunray Agricultural Historic District (VDHR #131-5325) is located at the southern terminus of the project area south of I-664 at its interchange with I-264 in Bowers Hill (Appendix A: Map 19). Sunray was listed on the NRHP in 2007 under Criteria A and C for its association with agriculture, community planning and development, a designed landscape, and ethnic heritage from the period 1908-1956. Sunray was a planned agricultural community, developed by Polish immigrants, in the early twentieth century (David 2007). Polish immigrants in the United States in the early part of the twentieth century were attracted to potential work opportunities in industrial centers, mining communities, and agricultural communities primarily in the northeast from New York to Chicago (David 2007). In the early part of the twentieth century, the approximately 1200 acres comprising the community was purchased by a real estate developer who, with the backing of shipping agents from New York assisting with the relocation of Polish immigrants, created the community of Sunray on tidal marshes associated with the Great Dismal Swamp. The early residents successfully drained and farmed the land and grew the community with the construction of a church, school, and residences. Presently, the community retains its Polish heritage and continues to function as an agricultural community. Sunray is bound on the north roughly by I-664 and Route 58/460 and on all other sides by the Great Dismal Swamp (David 2007).

# 2.2 PREVIOUSLY RECORDED RESOURCES DETERMINED NOT ELIGIBLE FOR LISTING ON THE NRHP WITHIN THE PAST FIVE YEARS

The number of previously recorded resources within the current APE surveyed between the years 2010 and 2015 which have been determined by VDHR as not eligible totals 524 (**Appendix B**). A majority of the resources were surveyed as part of the HRBT/HRCS project. The greatest concentration of resources was located in Norfolk with a total of 380. Hampton contained 112 with 28 in Portsmouth and four in Chesapeake (**Table 7**). Because the I-664 roadway alignment was not included in previous HRCS surveys from this date range, neither Newport News nor Suffolk contained any previously recorded resources surveyed within the last five years that have been determined by VDHR not to be eligible for listing on the NRHP.

# 2.3 PREVIOUSLY RECORDED RESOURCES RE-SURVEYED

As a result of the current investigation a total of 151 previously recorded resources were re-surveyed and V-CRIS forms updated per the standards of the VDHR (**Table 8; Appendix C:** Maps 1-18).<sup>2</sup> These resources were re-surveyed either because their V-CRIS records had not been updated in the past five years or because their NRHP eligibility had never been evaluated. Two resources, as a result of the current survey, are recommended as potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP: the Peninsula Catholic High School/St. Vincent's School for Girls (VDHR #121-0157) and the Brown Manufacturing/Coca-Cola Bottling Works/Daily Press Building (VDHR #121-0033) in Newport News. The two resources are recommended for Intensive Level survey as a result. Two resources, which had been previously determined potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP by VDHR, were resurveyed during the current effort to re-evaluate the resource's condition and determine if the resources remained potentially eligible: the Elmerton Cemetery (VDHR #114-0155) in Hampton and the Duke House (VDHR #124-0049) in Portsmouth. The Duke House, as a result of the current survey, is recommended as not eligible.

The Federal Highway Administration has identified no elements of the Interstate Highway System in Virginia as nationally and exceptionally significant elements of the system (https://www.environment.fhwa.dot.gov/histpres/highways list.asp); thus, the HRBT meets the criteria for exemption from consideration under Section 106 (Section 106 Exemption Regarding Effects to the Interstate Highway System, 70 Federal Register 11931 (March 10, 2005) as well as the exemption from consideration under Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act provided in Section 6007 of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act (SAFETEA-LU). Because of this status, the HRBT was not documented as part of the current survey.

\*Four previously recorded resources were not accessible; therefore, no determination of eligibility could be made during the current survey and these resources are not included in the count.

*Elmerton Cemetery (VDHR #114-0155)*, located in Hampton along N. King Street, was recommended for Intensive Level survey by VDHR in 2011 (**Appendix C**: Map 19). The cemetery contains the grave of Mary S. Peake, the first African-American teacher of free blacks at Fort Monroe, and has been a burial ground for African-Americans since the Emancipation Proclamation. The cemetery, however, has suffered from neglect and vandalism diminishing its integrity. Because VDHR recommended an Intensive Level survey for the cemetery, which has not been completed, it is recommended that the Intensive Level survey be conducted to determine the cemetery's NRHP eligibility.

Brown Manufacturing, Coca-Cola Bottling Works, Daily Press Building (VDHR #121-0033), located at 3200 Huntington Avenue in Newport News, is a c. 1940s Art Deco-style buff-colored brick structure with a central stepped bay featuring cast stone pilasters topped with Coca-Cola Contour bottle relief sculptures and a cast stone rectangular sign over the entry reading "Newport News Coca-Cola Bottling Works" (Appendix C: Map 20). The facade features cast stone "Drink Coca-Cola in bottles" rectangular panels between the first and second floor fenestration in each bay and stone pilasters topped with Coca-Cola Contour bottle relief sculptures at the facade corners and flanking the central bay. Although the original c. 1898 section of the complex (Daily Press Building) has been demolished, the c. 1940 Coca Cola plant (currently housing Brown Manufacturing), previously surveyed as a secondary resource, is a cohesive and architecturally intact resource on its own merit and is reflective of the commercial development of Huntington Avenue as a commercial/manufacturing corridor during the mid-twentieth century as well as the overall development of Newport News. As a result of the current survey it is recommended that the resource is potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP at a local level of significance under Criterion A and C and warrants Intensive level survey to definitively establish it NRHP eligibility.

*Peninsula Catholic High School/St. Vincent's School for Girls (VDHR #121-0157),* located at 332 34<sup>th</sup> Street in Newport News, was originally constructed in 1903 as a parochial girl's school with funds generously donated by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Fortune Ryan and operated by the Sisters of the Charity of Nazareth (Appendix C: Map 21). The school originally housed elementary grades 1-7 and high school grades 9-11. The school itself is a two-story, seven-bay brick structure laid in four course American bond with a hipped roof and features centrally-located two-leaf wood paneled doors with six-light windows with an arched fanlight above. The school is reflective of the early twentieth century educational history of Newport News and as a result of the current survey, the resource is recommended potentially eligible for the NRHP and warrants Intensive Level survey to definitively establish its NRHP eligibility under Criteria A and C.



Duke House/McCotter House (VDHR #124-0049), located at 3950 Cedar Lane, was constructed c. 1870 on the foundation of the original plantation house which burned (Appendix C: Map 22). The two-anda-half-story dwelling is Italianate in style and features a one-story porch with Ionic columns and denticulated cornice, two-over-two wood double-hung sash windows, a slate roof, and modillions under the eaves. Surviving secondary resources include a slave quarters, a smoke house, mid-twentieth century garage, and a barbeque pit. The resource was determined not eligible for listing on the NRHP by VDHR staff and that agency's State Review Board in 1982 and again by VDHR staff in 2009. The dwelling's eligibility was re-examined after the 2012 survey (Barile et. al. 2012) and in 2013 was determined potentially eligible by VDHR for listing with a recommendation for further study to "conclusively determine" its NRHP status. The dwelling, is a good example of late nineteenth century architecture on the front facade; however, the building has been altered with the addition of vinyl siding and in the rear with the addition of a large open ell and one-story ell which somewhat diminishes the architectural integrity of the dwelling. The slave quarters has also been extensively altered/renovated since the previous survey. It is recommended that the resource is not individually eligible for listing on the NRHP under Criterion A, B, or C.

In addition to the three potentially eligible resources detailed above, 149 additional previously recorded resources were resurveyed during the current effort. Of the 149 resources, 38 have been demolished. Secondary resources with no associated primary resources (i.e. has been destroyed, etc.) are considered not eligible as stand-alone structures. As a result of the current survey a total of 110 resources are recommended not eligible for listing on the NRHP, including the Huntersville Historic District (VDHR #133-5211). When VDHR staff reviewed the Huntersville Historic District in 2004 they determined that a small portion of the district, containing a Rosenwald School, (no individual VDHR number had been assigned), the Lily of the Valley Lodge (VDHR #133-5313), and possibly an additional building, may be eligible for the NRHP. They also suggested that the school and lodge may be individually eligible for the NRHP. The school could not be located during the present survey and appears to have been demolished. The Lily of the Valley Lodge has also been demolished and replaced with a modern dwelling.

# 2.4 NEWLY RECORDED RESOURCES SURVEYED

As a result of the current survey, 627 newly recorded resources were documented within the defined APE. Of the 627 resources dating to 1976 or prior within the APE, 625 have been recommended not eligible for listing on the NRHP (**Table 9; Appendix D**: Maps 1-23). Included among the resources recommended as not eligible for listing are the 17 1960s and 1970s historic districts and apartments listed in **Table 10**.

The following newly recorded properties were surveyed during the current effort; however, the view of the outbuildings, due to high fences, was limited. An effort was made to obtain permission from the owner of the property to access the property, particularly the fenced in rear yards in order to take photographs of the secondary resources. Permission to access the properties was denied by the owners at the following locations: 3620, 3617 and 3612 Forest Haven Lane in Portsmouth and 2521, 2630 and 2632 Gum Road in Chesapeake. In three instances, 5604 Pond Lane and 3648 Wright Road in Portsmouth, and 1042 42<sup>nd</sup> Street in Newport News, the owner was not home and the fence too high to take photographs. In these cases the resources were photographed to the full extent possible and included with the V-CRIS form. Surveyors were asked to leave the property designated as 2300 Jolliff Road according to the Chesapeake tax data after surveying three of the five dwellings located on the property: 2300 Jolliff Road (VDHR #131-5787), 2306 Jolliff Road (VDHR #131-5829) and 2308 Jolliff Road (VDHR #131-5830). The other two dwellings on the property were not able to be surveyed.

Two of the 627 resources have been recommended as potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP and warrant Intensive Level survey to conclusively establish their NRHP eligibility. These two resources include the Hampton Coliseum (VDHR #114-5600) in Hampton and the Willoughby Elementary School (VDHR #122-5930) in Norfolk.

*Hampton Coliseum (VHDR #114-5600)* (**Appendix D**; Map 24) was completed in 1970 by McDevitt and Street Co., of Charlotte, North Carolina, and is the first large-scale arena of its type built as a multi-



purpose building in Hampton Roads as well as in the state. The building features 96 triangular-shaped concrete wall panels on the exterior to create a unique design. The concrete panels were infused with stones to create a textured appearance. In addition, approximately 500 tons of structural steel was utilized in the construction of the cable-suspended roof ("History" 2015). It is recommended that the Coliseum meets the criteria necessary for listing on the NRHP under Criterion C for its architectural design as it embodies distinctive characteristics of a type and method of construction as well as possesses high artistic value and represents a significant and distinguishable entity.

Willoughby Elementary School (VDHR #122-5930) (Appendix D; Map 25), 9500 4<sup>th</sup> View Street, is a onestory L-shaped brick building constructed in the International style. The building retains a high degree of architectural integrity and features thick flat fascia, banks of steel and glass doors surrounded by glass transoms and sidelights on the front façade, side and rear doors sheltered by flat cantilevered hoods. Prominent office spaces are marked by exterior window bays framed from top to bottom in shallow projecting concrete screens and inset with large, two-part plate glass panels in fixed metal frames. Aside from select areas of windows, the building is almost completely devoid of windows. Opened in 1967 by the city of Norfolk, the Willoughby Elementary School was one of at least two schools built in rapid succession in response to explosive growth in Norfolk's post-WWII population of school-age children. The building's form reflects educational practice of its time period of a one-sizefits-all approach to the accommodation of learning. The building continues to function for the purpose it was designed, occupies its original location, and retains its original finishes and overall integrity of setting, design, materials, and workmanship. The Willoughby Elementary School therefore is recommended as potentially eligible listing on the NRHP under Criteria A and C for its significance in education and architecture. The building is recommended for Intensive Level survey in order to more fully develop its historical context and definitively establish its eligibility for listing on the NRHP.

Four previously recorded resources were not able to be resurveyed as access was denied. These resources include the Fire Apparatus Building/Pump House (VDHR #121-0055), Warehouses 36, 38, 40, and 42 (VDHR #121-0057), Warehouses 37, 39, 41, 43 (VDHR #121-0058), and the Field Office/Virginia Port Authority/Firehouse (VDHR #121-0059) at the Newport News Marine Terminal in Newport News **(Appendix D**; Map 26). These resources are not included in the total number of resources surveyed as specified above and the VCRIS forms were not updated. Existing available information on the resources is summarized below in **Table 11**.

# 2.5 OTHER HISTORIC RESOURCES

# 2.5.1 Battle of Craney Island (ABPP #VA400; VDHR#124-5267)

The ABPP has identified the Battle of Craney Island (ABPP #VA400; VDHR #124-5267) as one of 78 battlefields associated with events that had a demonstrable influence on the course, conduct, and results of the War of 1812. The ABPP classifies the Battle of Craney Island as a Class B. battlefield, or "site of a military or naval action with a significant objective or result that shaped the strategy, direction, or outcome of a campaign or other operation" (ABPP 2007: 24, 29, 61).

As defined by the ABPP and mapped in the files of the VDHR, the battlefield includes a portion of Craney Island and is located within the bounds of the Craney Island Fuel Depot near the mouth of the Elizabeth River and Craney Creek (**Appendix E**: Map 1). The battlefield, including the Core, PotNR, and Study Areas, measures approximately 259 acres including the parts of the battlefield on land and over water. The Core Area, which is coterminous with the PotNR area, is approximately 70 acres and located only on land.

In the War of 1812, British efforts revolved around the Royal Navy. One successful tactic was the small boat raid in which parties of roughly 1,000 men landed, wreaked havoc, and then withdrew to the fleet. These forces were large enough to overwhelm local militiamen but small enough to move quickly before US forces could gather and were usually successful. In May of 1813, following engagements in the northern Chesapeake Bay, attention turned south to the Hampton Roads. In the Battle of Craney Island on June 22, 1813, the British landed troops on the mainland, followed by a direct amphibious assault. The attacks came at high tide which held the British at bay. While they were raked by US artillery, the British had dozens of cannon but failed to bring any into play, leading to defeat (Butler 2013). The fight was brief and decisive in favor of the US defenders.

# Overview of the Battle of Craney Island

In December of 1812, Britain declared a blockade of the Chesapeake Bay. At the beginning of February in 1813, the Royal Navy began keeping station at the south end of the Chesapeake in Lynnhaven Bay, just west of Cape Henry and the open ocean. British strategy for the region was to control the Bay and its shipping. In general, the Royal Navy judged Hampton Roads too confined and dangerous and stayed out of the long anchorage leading to Virginia's interior. Virginians feared an attack on Norfolk and Brigadier General Robert B. Taylor mustered local defense forces. In March of 1813, General Taylor and his militiamen were transferred into the US Army and charged with defending the area. There was



relatively little in the way of men or material, but Taylor began organizing the defenses around Norfolk (Butler 2013, Lossing 1868).

The region is on the northern edge of the Great Dismal Swamp and the strongest element of its defense proved to be its swampy nature. Elizabeth River, one of the finest maritime waterways in the world, leads south into an area of flat ridges isolated by wetlands. Sir Thomas Dale wanted to settle the area in 1611, but was driven away by the Nansemond tribe. By 1813 the big settlement was Norfolk, about 6 miles south of Hampton Roads and sitting behind Fort Norfolk. Across the river was Fort Nelson. After much debate, the Virginians also fortified Craney Island, a truncated sand bar at the mouth of the Elizabeth River (Butler 2013).

Although it handles some of the biggest ships of the twenty-first century, outside its channels the Elizabeth is remarkably shallow and the flow coming down Hampton Roads deposited a bar of material almost halfway across its mouth. The Elizabeth's flow then cut through the upper end of this sandbar, creating the "Thoroughfare" and isolating Craney Island.

The Royal Navy continued to keep station in Lynnhaven Bay after February 1813, although the number of ships varied. This was only about 10 miles away from Norfolk overland through the swamps, but 25 miles by water. Despite this close proximity, the British continued to avoid the sheltered anchorage of Hampton Roads, which they apparently felt was too restricted and dangerous for their big ships. Its dangers included "infernal machines," floating naval mines manufactured by Robert Fulton. Left in peace, the Americans continued to fortify the area. In March of 1813, Taylor's defenses were reviewed by Col. Walker Armistead of the US Corps of Engineers and soon after the Americans began building works on Craney Island. In April of 1813, US Major General Wade Hampton took command. Hampton was a native of Halifax County, Virginia who had resettled in South Carolina (Butler 2013).

Hampton's command totaled about 4,500 men. The new fortifications were still under construction, including Craney Island. Hampton wanted a more powerful work there, specifically a brick fort jutting out into the river, but that was not possible. After less than two months, Hampton was transferred and the command returned to Brigadier General Robert Taylor on June 1, 1813 (Butler 2013).

A few weeks before, the Royal Navy had returned in force to Lynnhaven Bay, inspiring American efforts on Craney Island, about 20 miles upstream. The fortifications were a major project employing about 500 soldiers of the Second and Third Virginia Regiments, guarded by nine gunboats from the *Constitution*. Conditions were hard and Taylor soon rotated these men back to Norfolk, sending out the Fifth Virginia Regiment. The Fifth finished the earthworks and constructed a bridge capable of moving artillery across the Thoroughfare. They had about 500 men, with four 6-pounder guns, and four 18-pounders (Butler 2013).

When Wade Hampton left at the end of May, the British filled Lynnhaven Bay and Taylor expected battle. He told the commander of the Fifth Virginia: "all the cannon which can be used should be placed in a position to be fired." Taylor wanted the guns deployed to fight, even if their earthworks were not perfected. On June 6, 1813, Taylor pulled out the Fifth Virginia Regiment and rotated the Fourth Regiment onto Craney Island, moving command of the position to Lt. Colonel Henry Beatty (Butler 2013).

The waters around the island were guarded by the fleet of US gunboats which originated from the *Constitution* but became nicknamed "Jefferson's Bull Dogs." Despite British worries about Hampton Roads, three frigates were ordered to enter the waterway and anchor off Newport News. On the night of June 19, 1813, 15 of Jefferson's Bull Dogs picked up 50 soldiers from Craney Island and attacked the most isolated Royal Navy ship, sitting near the mouth of the James River. Confusion descended. The US



force began shooting about 3 a.m. on June 20<sup>th</sup>, triggering a melee involving about 165 cannon from which perhaps 700 balls were fired. Little was accomplished and Jefferson's Bull Dogs finally rowed away at dawn (Butler 2013).

Immediately after this, the Royal Navy moved into Hampton Roads. By dark on June 21<sup>st</sup>, the fleet was upstream beyond the Elizabeth, filling the anchorage around Newport News Point. This would have included four ships of the line, seven frigates, three sloops of war, six schooners, two brigs, and numerous barges. "You are to avail yourself," the supreme British commander told his admiral, Cockburn, "of any event to capture or destroy the enemy's frigate or vessels in the port of Norfolk (Butler 2013)."

*Norfolk* and *Constellation* made an irresistible pair, and the Craney Island battery stood in the way. These facts were obvious to everyone, and the Americans rushed to prepare. They were able to get only three guns ready to fight, an 18-pounder and two 24-pounders. The US commander was Lt. Col. Henry Beatty, a Revolutionary War veteran from Winchester. His force numbered about 800, primarily from the Fourth Virginia Militia Regiment, but also including about 150 men from the *Constellation* (Butler 2013).

Although they had lost the element of surprise, at dawn on June 22<sup>nd</sup> the British began landing troops commanded by Col. Sir Thomas Beckwith. The boats came in several miles upriver from Craney Island, east of modern I-664. The area immediately east of that modern landmark is dissected by multiple drainages, which the British would have been able to see from the Roads. They used the deep water at the mouth of Hoffler's Creek, coming ashore on the eastern side, near modern Lake Ballard, now the 4700 block of River Shore Road. A map by De la Roche (**Appendix E**: Map E-2) shows an earlier version of River Shore Road being used by the troops. It was a relatively simple march down the levee, crossing Capt. George Wise's plantation to the slave quarter. The Thoroughfare was 450 yards across but kneedeep at low tide. A US participant said: "We could distinctly see them marching and countermarching on the beach, and after forming into columns they took up the line of march; but such was the dense growth of trees and underbrush between us, that they were soon lost to our view" (Butler 2013).

As they watched the British coming, the Americans nailed their flag to a pole and raised it over their earthworks. They also shifted their three cannon to face the Thoroughfare. The British responded by firing a volley of Congreve rockets which frightened the Americans but quickly proved relatively harmless. Beckwith's force had a reasonable chance of success, but was stopped by the Thoroughfare, tidal gap between Wise's slave quarter and Craney Island. They arrived at the wrong time (Butler 2013).

Because of the range – about 450 yards – it was an artillery battle. As the British came through Wise's compound, a 24-pounder put a cannonball through one of the log buildings. The shot struck the chimney and sprayed brick fragments into the British, causing multiple injuries. When they regrouped and tried to wade over the gap, the water was too deep and the US gunners raked them with grapeshot.

As British hopes faded on the Thoroughfare, a second force in barges attacked the front of Craney Island. Again, the British telegraphed the move, giving the US defenders time to stop the men on the mainland and shift their cannon back to the Roads. Hanchette was in one of these barges, allegedly standing in the rear of his barge, wrapped in a Union Jack, sipping champagne, and shielding himself from the sun with an umbrella. He was quickly shot down and is said to have died from his wounds months later (Butler 2013).

The nature of the land once again stopped the British. Their boats grounded about 300 yards offshore and the US artillery cut them up. De la Roche depicts the main column as having missed the side



channel of the Thoroughfare and grounded on the extreme edge of the mudflats. With men packed into the boats headed towards the guns, a single US cannonball passing through went from end to end and meant a number of dead and wounded. The trapped men are said to have remained calm, and to have tipped their hats at the passing cannonballs.

It was a battlefield ruled by artillery from start to finish. Remarkably, the British brought no heavy guns into the fight, despite the Royal Navy sitting within plain sight. Eventually, they pulled back, and returned to their ships by dark. The number of casualties was unclear. The British published 3 dead, 8 wounded, and 52 missing, but this may be just the report for Beckwith's land force. It seems likely less than 200 British were killed. One American was killed by an accidental explosion, but a few others may have died as well – perhaps as many as nine. Also unclear was the proper assignment of credit for various acts. These heated debates persisted for the rest of the lives of some of the participants, and included an investigative committee appointed by the Virginia House of Delegates in 1849 (Niles Weekly 1813, Butler 2013).

#### Battle of Craney Island on Maps

There are two maps which appear to be of the period, one of uncertain origin in the Robert Barrie Papers at Duke University, which includes some soundings and distances. The second map, in the Library of Virginia, was drawn by George De la Roche, sailing master of the *USS Constellation*, on June 23, 1813 – the day after the battle (Erickson 2013) (**Appendix E**: Map 2).

De la Roche shows the British landing party on the eastern side of Hoffler's Creek, using an early version of River Shore Road, and depicts red blocks – probably British troops – going both inland and down the road towards Craney Island. The area is divided into six lots with fences, and the three closest to Craney Island include houses.

Continuing south down the mainland, De la Roche shows Wise's Creek, with a forest on the south bank, and the bridge to Craney Island. Two US gunboats guard the bridge. Continuing south, fenced lots enclose a very large house and dependency – the area Lossing labels "Stringers now Crockers."

In addition to US gunboats by the bridge, De la Roche recorded a line of gunboats blocking the channel to Norfolk, as does Lossing. De la Roche depicts three British columns. One is landing near Hoffler's Creek, another is off Craney Island in the Elizabeth River channel, and a third is grounded by the side channel leading through the Thoroughfare.

De la Roche depicts Craney Island as oblong almost totally enclosed in earthworks, except for the southwest side facing the Thoroughfare. He shows a tent camp in the center, possibly with some small huts, and a larger building at the southern end of the island. Three guns are shown facing the Thoroughfare and various others are scattered around the island.

Historian Stuart Butler found the period "Sketch of Craney Island" in the Robert Barrie Papers at Duke University. This shows gun boats across the river on the east, stretching between Sewell's Point and Lambert's Point. The island is a half-moon, with a roughly "C-shaped" work enclosing the northern half. The main battery appears to be in a straight face fronting northeast, covering the confluence of Hampton Roads and the Elizabeth River. The parapet continues a short distant down the Elizabeth River side and is refused, turning sharply southwest to provide cover for men in the main battery. On the west the parapet curved around and followed the Thoroughfare, providing protection from western Hampton Roads and the mainland about 250 yards west. The sketch illustrates the water around the island as less than 2 feet deep on all sides. The Thoroughfare is listed as 250 yards wide at the northern end, and 450 yards wide at the southern end, opposite Wise's Creek. A bridge, presumably the one



built by the Fifth Virginia Regiment, ran to the island from the southern side of Wise's Creek (Butler 2013, Erickson 2013) (**Appendix E**: Map 3).

A third illustration accompanies the 1868 history of the battle authored by Bernard Lossing, which is the most detailed early account of the battle. To the west on the mainland the Lossing map shows a substantial central-chimney, two-story residence for the landowner, Wise. "Wises quarters" were on the tip of the landform, looking across the Thoroughfare towards Craney Island. South of the quarters, Wise's Creek ran back up into the mainland and south of that the 1868 map shows "Stringers now Crockers" (Appendix E: Map 4).

# Current Conditions within the Boundary of the Battle of Craney Island (VA400).

Three of the proposed alignments associated with the HRCS cross this battlefield. Approximately four acres of the far western portion of the battlefield intersect with the APE for Direct Effects for the project and less than one quarter of the resource, again at the far western boundary, is located within the APE for Indirect Effects for the project (see **Appendix E**: Map 1). A large majority of the Craney Island Battlefield is located in woodland bound by the marshland associated with Craney Creek. The far eastern portion of the battlefield, at the mouth of Craney Creek at the intersection with the Elizabeth River is located within the Fuel Depot and is characterized by industrial development/buildings associated with the supply center. Immediately north of the Fuel Depot and adjacent to the mapped boundaries of the Battle of Craney Island, a dump site, owned by Portsmouth is present and extends to the boundary of the US Army Disposal Area.

Previous archaeological investigations conducted within the Craney Island Fuel Depot, the bounds of the Battle of Craney Island, and including the current project APE associated with the HRCS SEIS documented that little archaeological integrity remains within the APE for Direct Effects for the current project corridor. In 2007, during a survey of the Craney Island Fuel Depot conducted by SEARCH, Inc. on behalf of the Navy (Sara et al. 2008), no archaeological sites were identified within the current APE for Direct Effects. Site 44PM0061, located well outside the current APE of the HRCS project but within the bounds of the Battle of Craney Island, was subject to Intensive Level archaeological investigations. This site produced archaeological deposits associated with approximately 300 years of historic occupation at Craney Island (VDHR Site Files, 2016) including materials dating to the period of the War of 1812.

Additional investigations were conducted within the project APE and in support of the HRCS project in 2009 by CCR (Gosser et al. 2009) and included both systematic and judgmentally placed shovel testing to confirm both the presence of intact soil profiles as well as the presence of fill associated with the infill of Craney Island. Fill soils are documented as Udorthents and are present within approximately 50 percent of the APE for Direct Effects as it crosses the mapped boundaries of the battlefield resource (see **Appendix E**: Map 1). The survey corridor included an approximately 500-foot-wide area between VA 164 and the US Army Disposal Area and the 10,000-foot-long area for the collector road widening paralleling VA 164. The CCR survey for the Craney Island Marine Terminal access fully encompasses the current APE for Alternatives B, C, and D within the Battle of Craney Island resource boundary. A combination of methodologies was utilized for the survey including shovel testing on 37- to 150-foot intervals as well as selectively placed judgmental shovel tests to identify potentially significant archaeological resources as well as document the presence of disturbed and wet soils. No archaeological deposits were identified within the bounds of the Battle of Craney Island during this survey.



In 2011, Dovetail Cultural Resource Group (Barile et al. 2012) conducted a cultural resource survey in support of the Patriot's Crossing project to address slight design changes associated with the APE for the then-called Candidate Build Alternative 9 across Craney Island. This investigation also included detailed historic research associated with the Battle of Craney Island. The results of this research indicated that the historic landmass of Craney Island has been completely subsumed by the deposition of dredge spoils and man-made lands comprising the modern day Craney Island. Additionally it was noted that the portions of the Battle of Craney Island located within the project APE retained no integrity of workmanship, materials, design, setting, or feeling. The historic island and any potentially associated archaeological deposits have been significantly compromised and likely destroyed by the reconfiguration of Craney Island in the twentieth century.

A current comparison of the historic maps, a progression of early twentieth century topographic maps, and modern day aerial photography again confirms that the original landmass known as Craney Island was located to the east of the current project APE. The De la Roche map suggests that troops were encamped to the north and in the central part of the historic landmass of Craney Island and that the fortifications associated with the Island were located to the east near the mouth of the creek and to the north. The "thoroughfare" or canal noted in the historic documents has been filled and is no longer discernible. In addition, the entirety of the original island which is now encompassed in the much larger landmass occupied by the Fuel Depot, the Portsmouth landfill site, and the US Army Disposal Area, has been transformed through the man-made additions to Craney Island which took place in the twentieth century.

An overlay of the earliest available topographic map (Norfolk, 1902) with modern topographic mapping through the USGS Historical Topographic Map Explorer (<u>http://historicalmaps.arcgis.com/usgs/index.html</u>) confirm that the current project APE is located to the west of the circa 1812 island and fortifications. Overlays prepared utilizing the 1902 topographic map and modern aerial photography also illustrate that the location of the original circa 1812 landmass of Craney Island is located to the east of the APE for Direct Effects for the project while the APE for Indirect Effects just slightly crosses the far western edge of the historic island (**Appendix E**: Map 5).

The Battle of Craney Island, as mapped by the VDHR and documented by the ABPP is located within the bounds of the present day US Navy Fuel Depot at Craney Island. The entire historic footprint of Craney Island has been encompassed by the man-made fill now characterizing modern Craney Island which has affected the resource's overall integrity. Previously conducted archaeological surveys did not produce intact archaeological deposits and the vicinity of the project APE is characterized by modern land and fill. While an important battle in the War of 1812 resulting in the cessation of any further attacks on the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth, the Battle of Craney Island battlefield as it is today and within the Ape for Direct and Indirect Effects for this project, retains little to no integrity. The resource has been significantly altered and retains no intergrity of workmanship, materials, design, setting or feeling. The Battle of Craney Island as it pertains to the project APE is recommended not eligible for listing on the NRHP.

# 2.5.2 Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail

An evaluation of the NRHP eligibility of the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail (CAJO) is beyond the scope of the present study; however, for the ultimate purpose of assessing the potential effects of the HRCS on the trail, research was conducted to define and describe the condition



of sites, landscapes, and other types of features associated with the historical themes represented by the CAJO that may be present in the project area. The APE for Direct Effects used for the assessment of the CAJO was the same one used for other resources examined in the survey (see definition in Section 1.2), but a different APE was defined to capture any potential indirect effects the HRCS might have on the CAJO. The APE for Indirect Effects extends along the shorelines of Hampton Roads, Willoughby Bay, and the Elizabeth and James rivers from Fort Monroe on the east to just past the MMMBT on the west (**Appendix E**: Map 6).

The CAJO was designated by Congress in 2006 through an amendment to Section 5(a) of the National Trails System Act (16 U.S.C. 1244(a)) and is the first nationally designated water trail under the Act. The trail route extends throughout the Chesapeake Bay and includes tributaries explored by Smith. CAJO was further extended into four additional rivers considered as historic components of the CAJO by the Secretary of the Interior in May 2012. Per the National Park Service (NPS) documentation (Chesapeake Conservancy 2013): "The purpose of the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail is to commemorate the exploratory voyages of Captain Smith on the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries in 1607-1609; to share knowledge about the American Indian societies and cultures of the seventeenth century; and to interpret the natural history of the Bay (both historic and contemporary). Complementing the Chesapeake Bay Gateways and Water Trails Network, the Trail will provide new opportunities for education, recreation, eco-tourism, and heritage tourism in the Chesapeake Bay region" (National Park Service 2006).

#### John Smith's Time in the Project Area

Because Hampton Roads is the gateway to the Jamestown area of Virginia, Capt. John Smith passed through the study area on multiple occasions as he sailed from the James out to the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean. He undertook two major voyages of exploration, both in 1608, which traveled up the Bay to points north of Annapolis.

This period of exploration took place between June 2 and September 7, 1608. The first trip began on June 2<sup>nd</sup> and continued until July 21<sup>st</sup>. After a short break at Jamestown, he sailed again on July 24<sup>th</sup> and returned on September 7<sup>th</sup>.

Smith combined these and other journeys to create a guide to the region, a detailed 1612 report titled: "A Map of Virginia." This was supported by his more-famous map graphically illustrating his findings as well as data collected from informants. He distinguished between these sources with Maltese crosses: "The signification of these markes, To the crosses hath been discovered. What [is] beyond is by relation." The report explained further: "...in which map observe this: that as far as you see the little crosses on rivers, mountains, or other places, have been discovered; the rest was had by information of the savages, and are set down according to their instructions (Smith ND)."

His two famous journeys began on June 2, 1608. Smith left Jamestown "in an open Barge neare three tuns burthen" with a doctor, six gentlemen, and seven soldiers. They traveled in company with the London-bound Phoenix, commanded by Capt. Francis Nelson, who brought over the "First Supply." They passed through the project area, and Smith stayed with Nelson across the bay. Smith followed the channel out into the Atlantic and far enough around Cape Henry to make visual notes of Virginia Beach. They returned to Cape Charles on the tip of the Eastern Shore and began exploring the bay side of that landform (Smith 1608, Salmon 2011).



By July 17<sup>th</sup>, Smith had ranged north of Annapolis, beyond the site of modern Washington, D.C., and was returning south. Fishing at the mouth of the Rappahannock, he was stabbed by a stingray and the party headed directly for Jamestown. Skipping down the bay, they rounded Old Point Comfort and landed at Kecoughtan, the Algonquian place-name for modern Hampton. Because of their exposed position, the Kecoughtan Indians were relatively familiar with the English, who claimed to have fought their northern enemies, the Massawomecks (Salmon 2011).

After a few days at Jamestown, Smith made a few changes in his party, reduced its size, and continued his exploration. Leaving Jamestown on July 24, they returned to Kecoughtan, where they were delayed for a few days by bad weather (Salmon 2011).

Smith's party left Kecoughtan on July 27, 1608 and got 45 miles up the bay that day, reaching Stingray Point. On this voyage he went further north than before venturing up into the Susquehanna River. Returning south, he explored the Patuxent, the Rappahannock, and the Piankatank, before reaching the Poquoson River on September 3. They attempted to stop there but as the day faded they were driven out by a storm and finally found calm water at Old Point Comfort – in the project area (Salmon 2011).

After a day of rest at Old Point Comfort, the English continued on September 5<sup>th</sup>. The English report notes: "because we had onely but heard of the Chisapeacks & Nandsamunds, we thought it as fit to know all our neighbours neare home...." To actually meet the Chesapeake, they crossed Hampton Roads and explored up the Elizabeth River to the vicinity of modern Norfolk. Smith did not find the town of the "Chisapeack" on his voyage. He depicts it beyond the cross marking the limits of his exploration, meaning he got that information from informants.

Despite its future as a legendary maritime river, the Elizabeth apparently did not impress Smith. He depicted it as a short, curving line, without illustrating any of its three major branches. It seems likely Smith did not travel very far up the stream, and perhaps went no further than modern Lambert's Point. He may have misjudged the Western Branch. It seems almost certain he never saw the junction of the Eastern Branch and the Southern Branch, between Norfolk and Portsmouth.

Returning to Hampton Roads, Smith and his party sailed upstream – and out of the project area – where they encountered Nansemond Indians and sailed up that river. The English returned to Jamestown on September 7, 1608 (Salmon 2011).

#### Native American Activities in the Project APE

Captain John Smith actively sought interaction with the native people, realizing they were the best source of information for his report. Although there were many tribes in the area, he only associated two with the project area during his voyages, the Kecoughtan and the Chesapeake.

Although the English were told of the area occupied by the Chesapeake, they were also told Powhatan had exterminated that tribe. Noting they had "only but heard" of the Chesapeake, John Smith went up the Elizabeth in search. He did not find them and saw only "two or three little garden plots with their houses," and returned to the Hampton Roads in search of people. His map illustrates the Elizabeth as a relatively insignificant waterway and places the village of Chesapeake beyond the Maltese cross marking his limits of exploration. He illustrated the Elizabeth as a single stream, and does not show any of its three major branches (Smith 1608 and Huber 2015).



The English were also told Powhatan had recently transplanted new inhabitants to Kecoughtan. Sitting on the north side of Hampton Roads at the mouth of the Hampton River, Kecoughtan sat beside the superhighway of the region and was often visited by the colonists. The English stopped there when they first arrived in 1607. Despite his familiarity with the place and its people, John Smith said relatively little about Kecoughtan in his 1612 report, although the tribe was mentioned in his sequential descriptions of the shoreline:

".... then a convenient harbour for fisher boats or smal boats at Kecoughtan, that so conveniently turneth it selfe into Bayes and Creeks that make that place very pleasant to inhabit, their cornefields being girded therein in a manner as Peninsulaes...The most of these rivers are inhabited by severall nations, or rather families.... The first and next the rivers mouth, are the Kecoughtans, who besides their women and children, have not past 20 fighting men."

After his voyages of exploration in 1608, Smith was again forced ashore by weather and spent the end of the year: "where we were never more merry, nor fed on more plenty of good oysters, fish, flesh, wildfowl, and good bread, nor ever had better fires in England than in the dry, warm, smoky houses of Kecoughtan" (Salmon 2011). Friendly relations with Kecoughtan ended after the arrival of Baron De La Warre in the summer of 1610. The English landed, began playing music to attract a crowd, and then opened fire on the villagers, killing more than a dozen. In 1607, Kecoughtan had been one of the principal Powhatan districts. By 1616, it was an English settlement.

#### Known Locations of Native American Sites

John Smith identified two tribes in the project area, the Kecoughtan and the Chesapeake. The English were told that Powhatan had destroyed the Chesapeake, and although they explored that area, did not encounter people. Although a Chesapeake village is shown on Smith's map, it is also shown in an area beyond his limits of survey.

Previously recorded archaeological sites located within or adjacent to the APE for the CAJO are few. Those sites with Native American components that could be associated with Native American activities within the time period of Smith's journeys include 44HT0027 (Locus 3), 44HT0035, 44HT0089, and 44HT0063. Additional sites include a submerged site – 44SK0006 – located at Pig Point in Suffolk and west of the I-664/MMMBT and 44SK0481 a prehistoric site of unknown affiliation also located to the west of I-664 as it comes on land in Suffolk (see **Appendix E**: Map 7).

Site 44HT0035 is the site number assigned to the Veterans Affairs complex in which Native American period artifacts and deposits have been identified. Site 44HT0089, located on the point of land at Strawberry Banks in Hampton has been recommended potentially eligible for listing on the NRHP and may represent a Native American settlement that would have been present during Smith's explorations. The Village of Kecoughtan is often projected to be in the vicinity of 44HT0089 and 44HT0035. Although fragments of this village may survive, the general area has been occupied for centuries and is heavily developed.

Site 44HT0063 was noted as having Colonial period materials and possibly Contact period Native American deposits, however, it has likely been destroyed, according to reviews of current aerial photography. According to the interpretive plans and information compiled by the National Park Service there are only two sites – a stop-over site at Old Point Comfort on Fort Monroe and the possible location of the Village of Kecoughtan – that represent sites potentially associated with the



CAJO within the current project APE. It is not likely that additional significant archaeological sites associated with Smith's journeys are located within the project APE.

#### Current Conditions and Land Use within the APE

An overlay of current data generated from the National Land Cover Database (2011) indicates that 94 percent of the APE for the assessment of the trail is open water and that 4 percent of the overall APE is developed land. When removing the acres associated with water, the percentage of the shoreline within the APE for the assessment of the CAJO representing developed property is 66 percent. The shoreline within this APE and in the vicinity of Hampton Roads is one that has been developed for decades (see Appendix E: Map 7). Naval Station Norfolk was established in 1917 immediately after the US entered into WWI. Intensive residential development in Hampton and in Newport News and in particular along the waterfront of the Hampton Roads began in the early decades of the twentieth century. Waterfront homes and light commercial development characterize almost the entirety of the shoreline in Hampton and Newport News between the HRBT and the MMMBT crossings. In Norfolk, the shoreline within the APE for the assessment of the Trail is nearly all associated with Naval Station Norfolk, including the tidal wetlands present near Willoughby Spit and Mason Creek on the north. In Portsmouth and Suffolk the man-made Craney Island landform as well as residential and military development is present. In the documentation compiled by the NPS, it is noted that the Hampton Roads is at the entrance of a High Potential Route Segment that extends upstream. However, it should be noted that there are few areas, and no extensive areas, within the APE for the assessment of the CAJO for the HRCS SEIS project that are classified as "Visible Shoreline Generally Evocative of the 17<sup>th</sup> Century," a high-ranking criterion for assessing the location's inclusion in the High Potential Route Segment. Several areas are noted in the Willoughby section of Norfolk as well as to the west of I-664 corridor along the shoreline in Suffolk that are coded as evocative shoreline areas, but they are very small and isolated (Appendix E: Map 7). Open space is limited and is generally only present on the campus of Tidewater Community College to the west of I-664. Table 12 documents the current Land Use categories and their percentages within the APE.

Additionally, the HRBT and the MMMBT as well as other existing transportation features, including the James River Bridge (Route 17) and Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (Route 13), cross the CAJO. The portion of the CAJO located within the APE for the HRCS SEIS assessment is within a highly industrialized and developed area of Hampton Roads where few remnants of the historic landscape survive.



#### 2.5.3 Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail

An evaluation of the NRHP eligibility of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail (W-R NHT) is beyond the scope of the present study; however, for the ultimate purpose of assessing the potential effects of the HRCS on the trail, research was conducted to define and describe the condition of sites, landscapes, and other types of features associated with the historical themes represented by the W-R NHT that may be present in the project area. The APE for Direct Effects used for the assessment of the W-R NHT was the same one used for other resources examined in the survey (see definition in Section 1.2), but a different APE was defined to capture any potential indirect effects the HRCS might have on the W-R NHT. The APE for Indirect Effects extends along the shorelines of Hampton Roads, Willoughby Bay, and the Elizabeth and James rivers from Fort Monroe on the east to just past the MMMBT on the west (**Appendix E**: Map 8).

The W-R NHT was designated a National Historic Trail by Congress through an amendment to Section 5(a) of the National Trails System Act (16 U.S.C. 1244(a)) signed by President Obama in March 2009. The W-R NHT comprises over 680 miles of land and water trails in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, and Washington, D.C. (**Appendix E**; Map 8). The trail segments follow the routes taken by General Washington and General Rochambeau to and from the Siege of Yorktown during the Revolutionary War. Per the NPS documentation and strategic plan for the trail, the purpose of the W-R NHT is to "identify, preserve, interpret, and celebrate the American and French Alliance in the War for Independence. The mission will focus on three main areas: Improve visibility of the trail and its significance, convey the meaning of the route to the public by improved education and interpretation, and identify management partnerships and processes to create and manage the Washington-Rochambeau National Historic Trail" (National Park Service 2010).

#### Revolutionary War Activities in the Project APE

On July 11, 1780, a force of Frenchman consisting of 450 officers and 5,300 enlisted men disembarked in Narragansett Bay off Newport, Rhode Island. This army was under the command of General Jean Baptiste Donatien de Vimeur, comte de Rochambeau. The ensuing collaboration of Franco-American military forces allowed for success culminating with the defeat of British forces under Cornwallis at Yorktown in October 1781. The achievement of American independence was a direct result of this allied effort with Rochambeau's French Army, and it was followed by two centuries of Franco-American brotherhood which lasted throughout two World Wars (Selig 2003a). The routes taken by these two forces would cover over 600 miles and traverse through nine states and helped reflect the spirit of the march. Along the way the people of America would come to learn their perceptions of the French were misguided and a true spirit of allied kinship would slowly develop.

US General George Washington wanted to attack the British in New York City, but Rochambeau was not so certain. Finally the allies decided to wait out the winter. Poor roads and bad weather kept the forces at rest until May of 1780. Washington continued to urge an attack on New York City. The US and French forces agreed to rendezvous in Philipsburg, New York. The men began marching in mid-June, rising at 2 a.m. and reaching their next camp – 12 to 15 miles – by about noon (Selig 2003b).

The two armies united at Philipsburg on July 6, 1781. Parading, the French soldiers looked "superb." Their officers were horrified by the appearance of the Americans. Baron von Closen said:



It was really painful to see these brave men, almost naked with only some trousers and little linen jackets, most of them without stockings, but, would you believe it? Very cheerful and healthy in appearance.... Three quarters of the Rhode Island regiment consists of negroes, and that regiment is the most neatly dressed, the best under arms, and the most precise in its maneuvres (Selig 2003b).

The French decided to increase their forces by adding a battle fleet, commanded by Admiral de Grasse. Rochambeau did not agree with Washington's plan to attack New York City and was more interested in the south. British troops had been in Virginia since Christmas and soon after in 1781, established a base in Portsmouth. The men were joined by another army, commanded by Lord Cornwallis, which came up from the Carolinas on the same basic tracks as Interstates 85 and 95 to Petersburg. Cornwallis's men had fought through the Carolinas and in Virginia ranged as far west as Charlottesville, destroying military supplies (Selig 2003b).

Before the arrival of the French fleet, British vessels moved freely on the waterways in the project area, beginning with their arrival. In the summer of 1781 the British concentrated at Williamsburg, until Cornwallis was ordered to move to Portsmouth. He used the confusion of the shift to strike at US forces in the Battle of Green Spring on July 6, 1781, then crossed the James and marched southeast to Portsmouth. Although the original plan had been to ship troops back to New York, Cornwallis was ordered to settle in a base accessible to the Royal Navy. Leaving Portsmouth, the British force sailed to Yorktown and began digging in there on August 2, 1781 (Urwin 2010; Johnston 1881).

Still hesitating in Philipsburg, on August 14 the allies learned de Grasse was going to take control of the Chesapeake, and two days later, that Cornwallis had come to rest at Yorktown. Washington abandoned his New York plan and began rushing forces to Head of Elk in Maryland, to meet French ships (Grainger 2005).

On September 5, 1781, Washington learned de Grasse had entered the Chesapeake. The armies were near Philadelphia, at Chester, Pennsylvania. Over the next few days, the forces gathered at Head of Elk, Maryland. Down at the mouth of the Chesapeake, the French fleet met and defeated the Royal Navy in the Battle of the Capes. The French ruled the Chesapeake, and Cornwallis was cut off (Selig 2003b).

There was not enough shipping for the French and US troops. French shipping met the men at Annapolis on September 18 and began delivering troops to the York River on September 21<sup>st</sup>. These transports also went up the James River and unloaded at College Creek in the later days of September (Grainger 2005).

Starting at Head of Elk, a British intelligence report said, "all boats which could be procured on the Chesapeake were pressed, oyster boats and every kind of vessel capable of containing men." Washington assembled a "mosquito fleet," including "flat-bottomed boats which had been constructed at Albany." The Continental troops were loaded about and these hugged the western shoreline, stopping at night to allow the soldiers to land. At least one required six days to make the voyage, and some are known to have stopped in Hampton Roads, but further details are scarce (Grainger 2005; Conley 2014).

Most of the allied force was around Williamsburg by September 25. Some elements, like the French baggage train, came by land and were still on the road in October. The Siege of Yorktown officially began on October 6<sup>th</sup>, and continued until the British surrender on October 19, 1781 (Selig 2003b).



#### Known and Potential Revolutionary War Sites within the Project APE

The only known activities associated with the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route that seem to have occurred within the project area are the flotilla described (Conley 2014) by British spies that carried the Continental forces of General Washington from Maryland to Virginia on any vessel they could acquire. It is assumed they made various stops along the western shoreline during the journey but no descriptions of where these disembarkations occurred could be located. As illustrated on the map *Campagne en Virginie du Major Général M'is de LaFayette : ou se trouvent les camps et marches, ainsy que ceux du Lieutenant Général Lord Cornwallis en 1781* (Appendix E: Map 9) vessels certainly moved through the Hampton Roads on the way to Yorktown, but information on known stops or potentially associated sites is not detailed.

The town of Hampton and various residential dwellings would have existed along the shoreline and possibly provided soldiers with temporary respite from their watercourse journey, but again, surviving records do not indicate any areas of known activity within the existing project area. A review of VDHR's V-CRIS database identified only one known archaeological site within the APE that could potentially be associated with the historical themes represented by the W-R NHT. Site 44HT0015, located at the mouth of the Hampton River, is a map projected site associated with potential shipwrecks associated with the Revolutionary War period. As noted in the site form for 44HT0015, "in October 1775, Americans at Hampton sunk a line of vessels across the mouth of the Hampton River, to prevent the British from invading Hampton, an important seaport at that time ...Tenders (were) anchored close to where several vessels had been sunk in the channel of Hampton River, to prevent their surprising us. The channel was not completely stopped...they intended to prevent our completing the work...in the night (the British) cut a passage through the vessels that were sunk" (Pinkney, Nov. 12, 1775, page 2, column 2). This site has not been extensively investigated nor would it be directly impacted by the HRCS project. However, it could be associated with the W-R NHT and its interpretation.

#### Current Conditions and Land Use within the Project APE

An overlay of current data generated from the National Land Cover Database (2011) indicates that 94 percent of the APE for the assessment of the trail is open water and that 4 percent of the overall APE is developed land. When removing the acres associated with water, the percentage of the shoreline within the APE for the assessment of the W-R NHT representing developed property is 66 percent. The shoreline within the APE and in the vicinity of Hampton Roads is one that has been developed for decades (see Appendix E: Map 8). Naval Station Norfolk was established in 1917 immediately after the US entered into WWI. Intensive residential development in Hampton and in Newport News and in particular along the waterfront of the Hampton Roads began in the early decades of the twentieth century. Waterfront homes and light commercial development characterize almost the entirety of the shoreline in Hampton and Newport News between the HRBT and the MMMBT crossings. In Norfolk, the shoreline within the APE for the assessment of the Trail is nearly all associated with Naval Station Norfolk, including the tidal wetlands present near Willoughby Spit and Mason Creek on the north. In Portsmouth and Suffolk, the man-made Craney Island landform as well as residential and military development is present. Open space is limited and is generally only present on the campus of Tidewater Community College to the west of I-664. Table 2-8 documents the current Land Use categories and their percentages within the APE.



Additionally, the HRBT and the MMMBT as well as other existing transportation features, including the James River Bridge (Route 17) and Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (Route 13), cross the W-R NHT. The portion of the W-R NHT located within the APE for the HRCS SEIS assessment is within a highly industrialized and developed area of Hampton Roads where few remnants of the historic landscape survive.

### 3. SUMMARY

The current architectural survey conducted in support of the HRCS SEIS resulted in the documentation of a total of 778 resources including 151 previously recorded resources (38 of the previously recorded resources have been demolished) and 627 newly recorded resources (see **Tables 8 and 9**). The summary also takes into account the 524 previously recorded resources determined not eligible by VDHR which had been surveyed between 2010 and 2015 (see **Table 7**). Nineteen previously NRHP-listed and eligible resources are located within the APE as well as five resources newly recommended as eligible or potentially eligible (included in the 778 resources surveyed during the current project) (**Table 13**). **Table 14** summarizes the results of the survey for all four Build Alternatives. **Table 15** summarizes the results of the survey by city. Three additional resources were also assessed: the Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267), the Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail, and the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route National Historic Trail.

#### 3.1 ALTERNATIVE A

A total of 845 resources are located within the APE for Alternative A (**Table 14**). The resources include eight NRHP-listed and seven NRHP-eligible previously recorded resources as well as three resources recommended as eligible or potentially eligible. A total of 827 resources which have been determined or recommended as not eligible for listing on the NRHP are located within the APE of Alternative A. The Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail and the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Trail are also within the APE for Alternative A.

#### **3.2** ALTERNATIVE B

A total of 956 resources are located within the APE for Alternative B (**Table 14**). The resources include eight NRHP-listed and eight NRHP-eligible previously recorded resources as well as four resources recommended as eligible or potentially eligible as a result of the current survey. A total of 936 resources which have been determined or recommended as not eligible for listing on the NRHP are located within the APE of Alternative B including The Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267). The Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail and the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Trail are also within the APE for Alternative B.

#### 3.3 ALTERNATIVE C

A total of 456 resources are located within the APE for Alternative C (**Table 14**). The resources include three NRHP-listed and three NRHP-eligible previously recorded resources as well as three resources recommended as eligible or potentially eligible as a result of the current survey. A total of 447 resources which have been determined or recommended as not eligible for listing on the NRHP are located within the APE of Alternative C including The Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267). The Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail and the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Trail are also within the APE for Alternative C.



#### 3.4 ALTERNATIVE D

A total of 1,321 resources are located within the APE for Alternative D (**Table 14**). The resources include 11 NRHP-listed and eight NRHP-eligible previously recorded resources as well as five resources recommended as eligible or potentially eligible as a result of the current survey. A total of 1,297 resources which have been determined or recommended as not eligible for listing on the NRHP are located within the APE of Alternative D including The Battle of Craney Island (VA400; VDHR #124-5267). The Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail and the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route Trail are also within the APE for Alternative D.





Appendix E: Map E-3. : "Sketch of Craney Island," Robert Barrie Papers, Duke University, from Erickson 2013.






